Bell champions customer experience with strong CCTS performance



Bell is continuing to lead the way among national service providers at reducing customer complaints as reflected in the mid-year report from the Commission for Complaints for Telecom-television Services.

While complaints to the CCTS from August 2022 to January 2023 as a whole increased by 12% year-over year, Bell experienced a 6% decrease and reduced our overall share of customer complaints to less than 15%. Bell's share of complaints have decreased by 16% year-over year, and an impressive 55% since the 2018-2019 mid-year report was published.

2023 cost of living adjustment

To offset increases in the cost of living, Bell's pension payments are adjusted according to an indexation formula. The indexation rate applied to Bell pensions as of January 1, 2023 is 2% for retirees under age 65 and 4% from age 65.

For those who retired during 2022, the indexation rate is prorated to the number of months since their retirement date.

2023 Certification of Pension Entitlement

As part of good governance practices, Bell Canada conducts an annual audit of pension recipients. Every year we select a group of pensioners in the BCE group of companies and ask them to complete a Certificate of Pension Entitlement to ensure that payments are reaching the appropriate individuals.

Our next audit will take place in the spring. Audited pensioners will receive a form to complete and to send back to the Pension Department as soon as possible. Furthermore, the online tool for the pension audit will be available on the Benefits site (bell.ca/ mybenefits) for audited pensioners who want to submit their forms online.

Submit your benefits claims online

Bell retirees can go paperless and use Manulife's secure online claims process, making benefits reimbursements faster and easier. If you're not already submitting claims online, the first time you access the site you'll be prompted to provide your email address and banking information.

You may be asked to attach a photo of your receipt when submitting your claim. Once your account is set up, notifications will be sent by email and your claim will be paid directly into your bank account within 1 to 5 business days. To submit your claim online, log into the Manulife Plan Member Website at www.manulife.ca/signin.



Louis A. Tanguay Recognized by the Montréal Sacré-Coeur Hospital Foundation

Louis A. Tanguay, a Bell retiree and former president of Bell Québec, was recently honoured for his 30 years as a volunteer with the Sacré-Cœur Hospital during the Gala des Émilie. The annual gala celebrates the commitment and dedication of volunteers and healthcare professionals from the Sacré-Cœur and Albert-Prévost hospitals.

Louis has been a member of the Montréal Sacré-Coeur Hospital Foundation's board of directors since 1987. A mentor to many, Louis put his extensive knowledge of the business community to good use by mobilizing his peers in support of hospital initiatives. Remembering the 1998 Québec ice storm

It has been 25 years since the January 1998 ice storm – the worst natural disaster in Québec's history. It was also one of the most significant events in Bell's history, requiring a massive mobilization of human and material resources to minimize the storm's impact on the communications network.

Thanks to a robust network and the rapid deployment of emergency teams, Bell was able to maintain telephone service for 98% of our customers.

The sense of solidarity that developed from the very beginning of the storm, and the speed with which our teams adapted were remarkable. Knowing the colossal task at hand for the installation and repair teams, all of Bell's technicians in Québec and their colleagues in Ontario rallied to support those who were impacted. Technicians from Atlantic Canada, including Island Telecom in Prince Edward Island also stepped up to assist.

As the storm progressed, the Government of Québec asked the Bell Emergency Operations Centre to set up a call centre to be used by the Department of Public Safety. Our teams took just four hours to open a helpline to take calls from citizens. The Telephone Operator Department doubled their efforts as the storm had resulted in an unusually high number of calls. At the height of the storm, telephone







operators received three times as many Directory Assistance calls as usual, and twice as many long-distance calls.

A big thank you to all Bell retirees who were involved in our storm response efforts.

Bell Let's Talk Day creates positive change for our partners

On January 25, Bell Let's Talk Day invited Canadians to take action and focus on the importance of the support offered by mental health partners across Canada. Individuals, communities, governments and organizations took meaningful action to help create change where they live and work. One in two Canadians said this year's campaign encouraged them to take action related to mental health, according to an online panel survey by Angus Reid Group on behalf of the Market Knowledge Centre (MKC).

The campaign was a big success for our Bell Let's Talk mental health partners too, encouraging people to learn about the support and services they provide. Here's how the following featured organizations were impacted in a positive way:

- <u>Jeunes en tête</u> has experienced a significant growth of 51% in new users for their online tools and 35% in Google searches.
- <u>Foundry</u> has doubled their amount of first time visitors on their website and noticed an increase of 40% in engagement on Instagram.
- The <u>National Association of Friendship Centres</u> website had a 96% increase in new visitors and reached over 33,000 visits on their Facebook page.
- Web traffic for <u>Rise</u> increased by 948% on Bell Let's Talk Day.

Bell is hiring more team members for high-tech roles

Bell's goal to recruit more high-tech professionals was highlighted in a La Presse article that featured interviews with Bell's executives.

The article notes that "while the technology industry is cutting jobs by the tens of thousands, Bell Canada is taking the opposite route: the telecommunications company wants to hire a thousand people."
